

# Take this to your GP

If you're worried about your risk of prostate cancer or any symptoms you're having, you might find it helpful to fill out this form and take it to your GP.

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# Questions you could ask your GP or practice nurse

Am I at risk of prostate cancer?

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What tests do you suggest and why?

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What are the advantages and disadvantages of having these tests?

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How soon will I get the results?

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## Tests for prostate cancer

You have the right to a PSA (blood) test to help diagnose prostate cancer if you're over 50 and you've thought carefully about the advantages and disadvantages. If you then decide that you want a test, your GP should give you one.

A PSA test isn't suitable for everyone. For example, your GP may not recommend it if your general health means you wouldn't be fit enough for treatment for prostate cancer, or if treatment wouldn't help you to live longer.

If your GP doesn't agree to do a PSA test, ask them to explain why, as there may be a good reason.
